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Nearly 12,000 Go Car Free or Car-Lite

Pledges Surpass Last Year's Car Free Day Participation by 70%

Washington, D.C. — Nearly 12,000 people in the metropolitan Washington region pledged to "Uncar for a Day" or go Car-Lite on Car Free Day, September 22, according to Commuter Connections, a regional transportation network coordinated by the National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board at the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments. Pledges for this event increased by 70 percent over the number of pledges last year.

In 2008, the event was expanded to the entire Washington metropolitan region.
